Building maintenance and operations monthly report December 2022

December started out on a good note with a very good amount of snow and the potential for an early start to our grooming season, at one point we had close to 20 inches of snow, and we had moved our groomers up to Moose River Plains, we made three groomed passes in and out of Moose River before the weather changed and became rain and warm temperatures. On the woods trails we found many mud holes open and we're unable to get any equipment on either trails to Blue Mountain or trail to moose river, after we spent a few weeks of cleaning up mud holes, we had some high winds that had us back out on the trails cutting trees for most of the month until the big thaw hit Christmas week. All of our equipment sits up at headquarters ready to go, now it's just a waiting game on the weather.

While we had the colder temperatures we were able to get the rink in shape and we were open through Thursday of winter vacation before we lost everything, including the sliding on the second slope. Turn out at the skating rink was actually very good during the Christmas break, we had between 75 and 80 skaters here and numerous sliders while we were open. There were a lot of new faces and first time skaters, and everyone was very understanding when we told them about the weather, and what happens to the rink.

During our downtime, we were able to do maintenance on our vehicles, oil changes, and repairs that needed to be done. We cleaned the shop after many projects and made numerous dump runs.

The pellet boiler is once again on my list, we were notified by Vincent, that they will no longer be providing us with pellets as they sold their truck. We decided to see just how long a pallet full of pellets would last us, and the answer was not very good, five days and a ton of pellets at 25°. We have turned off the pellet boiler and are now going strictly with fuel.

We have put in two charging ports at our garage for the electric car so that it can be fast charged, we were unable to put one at the welcome center due to the fact it is three phase power and the car recognizes that it's not correct and will not charge, it will still slow charge off a standard outlet but the charge time from empty to full is almost 24 hours. Christine knows the situation and she knows she can get power up here whenever she needs it.

Main Street America (MSA) Committee – I completed and submitted the ILCDC final report for their Main Street Grant. The next meeting will be on January 25, 2023, via ZOOM to start formulating the four working groups and establishing a name for the project.

NYSERDA Clean Energy Update – We have completed three of the four High Impact Actions required and now have 700 points. The next one I'm trying to get completed is the national Grid LED Street Lamps in Indian Lake (BML is completed with 55 upgraded; at last check we needed 183 to be completed in Indian Lake). Once we complete one more project, we qualify for a \$5,000 grant award.

Events - 2023

<u>Lake Placid 2023 FSU World University Games</u> will take place January 12-22 in the lake Placid area as well as in North Creek at Gore Mountain (11 events pertaining to snowboarding and skiing). I have distributed information specific to the events at Gore to our businesses to ensure they are aware of the activities and to alert them to a possible influx of traffic. We will be receiving two banners and have a photo opportunity cutout at the Welcome Center. A handout detailing event dates and times will be placed in board and staff mailboxes.

<u>Snocade</u> is currently being planned. 3,000 placemats will be ordered detailing event information and distributed to restaurants and bars by Martin Luther king Weekend. As events and activities are finalized, they'll be added to the events calendar on our website, as well as other regional community calendars.

 LaBella to find out why we were not funded.
- · The Charging Station Grant awards will be announced in the 1st quarter of 2023.

· Pending grant projects included the following:

- ESD Market NY is being closed out. Funds anticipated by March 2023.
- DEC Hamlets Gateway grant needs to have a timeline and budget modification processed by DEC.
- DEC Cunningham Land Acquisition will be heading into the close-out process. Distribution of funds TBD.
- We are still waiting for two DASNY Member Item grants to be processed. One for \$2.5M for Lake Adirondack Dam and the other for \$300,000 Townsend Garage purchase. DASNY is slow in providing any details re: when we can expect to receive these payments.
- The grant for DEC Byron Park Improvements also needs modifications and is pending as it is tied directly to the Lake Adirondack Dam project.
- Grants we can apply for in 2023 included:
 - Adirondack Foundation due 2/1/2023. Awards range from \$5K to \$7,500 with some awards at the \$10K level. Project areas Environment (trails and ski hut upgrades); Arts & Culture (mural on Welcome Center building); and Economic Vitality (generator for Welcome Center).
 - Adirondack Community Recreation Alliance due 2/25/2023. Projects sought are to create and/or enhance local efforts to increase the community benefit of outdoor recreation. The maximum award is \$5,000. Project ideas (ski hut upgrades and trails).
 - DEC High Hazard Rehabilitation Grants due 2/10/2023. Minimum award is \$25,000 and Maximum is \$100,000. (Proposed project is the Adirondack Lake Dam)





Dear Governor Hochul:

On behalf of the New York State Snowmobile Association (NYSSA) and its 220 snowmobile clubs, representing over 50,000 members and serving as the voice for over 120,000 snowmobilers who use New York's 10,000 miles of snowmobile trails, I respectfully ask you to consider raising all snowmobile fees in the FY 2023- 2024 Executive Budget proposal. Last session, the NYS Assembly expressed its support of NYSSA on this issue by overwhelmingly passing legislation that would increase snowmobile registration fees (A7747B – Magnarelli). We believe there will be the same level of support in the Senate in the upcoming Session.

We are requesting an increase to snowmobile registrations fees to support the Snowmobile Trail Development and Maintenance Fund, which is a dedicated source of funding that helps municipalities, and their snowmobile club partners to properly maintain and groom the state's snowmobile trails which is a critical component of helping to ensure driver safety on snowmobile trails. Nearly all the revenues for this fund are generated through a portion of snowmobile registration fees.

While we understand that proposing a fee increase can be challenging, this is a unique association member driven request, as almost all snowmobile trail funding is generated by the registered snowmobiles of those who participate in the sport. As the voice of the snowmobiling industry, we are requesting an increase of registration fees to improve the state's trail system in your FY 24 Executive Budget proposal. This increase will drive winter tourism in New York and help to keep the New York snowmobile trail system competitive with other states in the region.

The last time there was a registration fee increase was in 2004, two years prior to the Snowmobiler Rights and Responsibility Act took effect (Ch.609, L.2005). Snowmobile club members, whether from New York or another state, have been paying \$45 per

registration for 18 years. This is the longest-tenured registration fee schedule since the trail fund was first established in 1987; it has not been adjusted for cost-of-living expenses or inflation. In consideration of cost of living and inflation indicators, the club member fee of \$45 in 2005 would be worth a little under \$65 today (\$69), and the non-club member fee of \$100 would be worth \$153 today.

Eighteen years is a significant length of time for fee stagnation, especially when considering that almost all the items the clubs use have had significant price increases. Further, over the past several years, neighboring states New Hampshire and Vermont have raised their fees substantially, while Maine is also considering a fee increase. These states have recognized cost increases in the industry, such as with a large groomer (Class A) which cost \$160,000 in 2006, but now costs \$260,000 or more in 2021.

NYS Snowmobile Club members are trail maintenance entities, and therefore shoulder the burden of purchasing and operating the groomers that are required to properly maintain the State trail system. Comprised almost entirely of volunteers, these members of the state's association of 220 snowmobile clubs groom 10,000 miles or more of Interconnected Trail System. These club volunteers are dedicated to keeping the trail system well-maintained and well-marked to ensure the safety of snowmobilers. The clubs take on the responsibility and the financial obligation to maintain the trails throughout the year.

Clubs have been struggling to find additional funding resources to keep the trails in decent shape, and they just cannot maintain current levels of support to the trails with existing funding. This past year, clubs reported over \$7 million in expenses, of which they received about \$4.2 million from the Trail Fund. It is time to raise the snowmobile registrations and distribute that additional revenue to the clubs that need it the most to keep up with the traffic on their trails. The proposed increase could generate another \$2,000,000 for the Trail Development and Maintenance Fund.

Snowmobiling is an important component of New York State tourism, creating much-needed jobs and generating vital revenue to many Upstate and Western New York businesses and communities. In fact, many out-of-state snowmobilers make it a priority to visit New York for its vast network of scenic snowmobile trails, generating much needed tourism dollars to the Upstate economy.

In January 2012, NYSSA undertook a survey performed by the Potsdam Institute for Applied Research to examine the economic impact of snowmobiling in the state during the 2010-2011 season. Analysis of the survey established that snowmobilers contributed \$868 million to the NY economy and that much of that was in Upstate NY. The proposed snowmobile registration fee increases are critical for the long-term fiscal capability of the snowmobile clubs that sustain the trail system that contributes to New York's economy.
