Military Flag Proposal

Elizabeth Cannan and Vicky Marques approached the Board with a proposal to hang Military Flags on the utility poles. Elizabeth stated that they would be holding numerous fund raisers to purchase the flags. She stated the biggest question is the poles, who do they contact and who gets them approved. Supervisor Wells told Elizabeth to get a list of the pole numbers and we will turn them in. He explained this is a long process and there are some poles they will not allow any flags on. He stated flags are covered under Town Insurance. Vicky stated that they had a list of the pole numbers already. She also asked if they could use the aluminum poles. Supervisor Wells stated National Grid will not allow that. Vicki asked who owns the poles, Town or National Grid, Supervisor Wells explained to her that they are owned by National Grid. Discussion was held on how they would handle putting the flags up and where the flags can go. They stated that it would be a first come first serve basis in the beginning. Vicki also stated they are considering having them up from Memorial Day to Veterans Day on a two-year cycle. Meaning, first flags, will be up for two years, after that the next group will go up for the next two years. Discussion was held on the number of flags the Town already has that need to be put up throughout the years. Councilman Mahoney asked how many veterans or families have signed up. Vicki stated they did not have a number yet as to how many people may be interested in participating. Liz stated that to purchase a flag the veteran or family must have ties to Indian Lake. The Military Flag proposal is attached herein. Supervisor Wells stated that the banners need to be the same size and have the same brackets as the flags that are hanging now. Supervisor Wells also stated the Highway would need to be contacted as that is the department who would be using their equipment and manpower to put the flags up and take them down. The Town Board unanimously approved letting Liz and Vicky move forward with this project. Supervisor Wells reiterated that this could take some time getting permitted through National Grid.

Public Comments and Concerns

Brenda Valentine approached the Board stating that 25 plus people are actively helping to revitalize the Town. She stated they are working on many projects to upgrade the way we look. They are taking a look at the businesses on main street and if a business would like to change the way they look and make their business more appealing, they will help them. One group is looking into taking wooden paddles and making directional signs out of them. Another is looking into doing a survey of the businesses and asking them what their needs are. She reported to all one of their activities is "Ribs for Sibs a benefit for the Hamilton Revitalization Project. This will be held at the Chef Darrell's Mt. Diner on August 5th 1:00 pm -5:00 pm. SIBS stands for "Sabael, Indian Lake and Blue Mt. Lake" as they are all in the Hamlet of Indian Lake. Connie Sahler approached the Board telling all about the Paddle Sign Project. Discussion held on how the new Paddle signs could work and if there were any Planning or Zoning Rules concerning these as they will have business names on them and where they could be placed. She told all present the Paddles were donated by the Indian Lake Marina. She stated that they also donated canoes as part of an art project. She would like to see the Town utilize these pieces as art with the Town Logo and brighten up and add color to the Town. She stated this is in the early stages and more would be coming. Connie Sahler approached the Board concerning the bathrooms in Blue Mt. She stated that people are actually stopping at a private residence and using his porta pottie. She stated that due to beaches only being

open every other day the bathrooms are not open. Bill LaPrairie, Department Head of Buildings and Grounds stated those bathrooms are open every day whether the beach is open or not. They are open all the time. Supervisor Wells stated that at one time we had worked with Philip Joyce's bathrooms at the store in Blue Mt. and if the new owner would like to open them up the Town would offer the same services to him.

Department Head/Public Comments and Concerns

Bill Laprairie, Department Head of Buildings and Grounds, approached the Board asking if the Town Van was going to be used all summer by the Youth Program? Supervisor Wells stated that this is a needed service, and he is hoping to use it more and it's a good emergency vehicle. Bill stated that since that was used by 2 of his employees can he get permission to start looking for another truck for their use? Supervisor Wells told him to check his budget and start looking. Councilman Rathbun stated maybe he could find a used one. Supervisor Wells stated that the requisition prices and procurement policy and having to go out to bid this would be difficult to work through.

Digital Towpath

Supervisor Wells reported to all that the Digital Towpath Web site will no longer be used by the Board, people should be using indianlakeadk.com, it is unclear if the Digital Towpath website for Indian Lake will be taken down.

Vector One I. T. Solutions

Supervisor Wells stated the Board had their packets concerning Vector One I.T. Solutions. He reported to all due to all the hacking and viruses our Insurance Company is strongly suggesting that we get a protected web site. This protects us from ransom sites and numerous other viruses. Supervisor Wells tabled this until the next meeting. Jack Valentine questioned will this company guarantee no one will hack into our system? Will our insurance now cover the loss? Supervisor Wells stated my understanding is that the insurance company has many requirements that Vector One IT Solutions would have to meet in order for them to be okayed to provide the service. Pamela Howard asked if it would cover all of the "important" computers that contain sensitive information? Supervisor Wells stated that yes, it would cover those computers.

Data Collector Position

Supervisor Wells stated we advertised for a part-time data collector position, we need to gather information for a re-evaluation of the town, it's been 7 or 8 years since we've had one. We received one application; our assessor Lynn Billings has been asked to conduct an interview with the applicant to see if they qualify to meet the requirements (gathering data in the field) of the position. New York State used to offer a rolling program that allowed for a 7-year cycle for re-evaluations, but the state no longer does that. Hamilton County Real Property/ Barry Baker offered a cost per lot price, which would have started at over \$100,000, we would still have had to do a lot of the work.

Resolution 13- Lake Adirondack Dam Repair

Supervisor Wells stated we are working on the Adirondack Dam, it has taken a very long time, covid supply issues, manpower, State Agencies. Adirondack Explorer has written huge articles pointing the finger at the towns, a lot of the time its not the towns choice to not complete the work.

Monthly Report for building maintenance and operations department, June 2023

During the month of June, we have mowed all over our town properties twice, including the transfer station, shooting range, and all cemeteries. The new mower we ordered from H and M equipment arrived just in time as one of our older tractors went down with hydraulic issues, we made repairs to the unit and will continue to use this as a spare lawnmower as needed. We did our first mowing of the bike trails across the slopes, we have noticed the trails being used primarily on the weekends.

We have had both burials and cremations this month at the Catholic and Cedar River cemeteries and are aware we have three more coming up all in the Cedar between now and August.

We have spent a good amount of time out on the lake taking care of bogs, we have successfully pushed four large bogs back into the corral and we are still working on smaller ones as we get the time. We still have a Large bog under water in Ernie cove that we will continue to work on.

This was our easy year for the black fly challenge, it started in Indian Lake and ended in inlet, We put up signs, barricades, and a few cones, and sent them on their merry way, and we cleaned up when the event was over.

The generator at the health center is being replaced and we have disconnected the unit and are waiting for Adirondack generator to get here and do the install, the site has been prepped and concrete poured for the new unit.

Little League season came to an end and we tilled the field in preparation for next year and we received thank you cards from both teams. At some point in time we need to get a load of clay to redo the base lines.

The middle of this month we put the beaches in and set everything up for the season. Both beaches will be closed one day a week because of staffing issues, and we have taken the necessary steps to close the beaches on those days.

Last month we talked about the Town trash pick up day, which was done on the sixth and seventh of this month, It took two full days to get everything and everyone.

We had our annual DEC inspection at the wastewater plant. Everything seemed to go well.

With the help of the Highway Dept. we blacktopped our water line repair spot in Blue Mt. It took about 6 tons of hot mix.

Grants

DEC High Hazard Rehabilitation Grants – submitted a total grant project of \$177,958.63 with a request for \$100,000. DEC rec'd six applications (including ours) for this project and all were declined for one reason or another. For us, we need to submit an annual certification and updated Emergency Management Plan. Once we complete, we'll be issued an award letter.

The next round of Consolidated Funding Applications to NYS is July 28. With LaBella's assistance, we will be applying for The LWRP for the Townsend Project and WQIP for the Adirondack Lake Dam. More information will be confirmed after a series of grant discussions to finalize project costs and matches required.

We received an award of \$1,750 from NYSCA's Statewide Community regrant to support the 2nd Annual Indian Lake Paint Out! three-day plein air workshop with Bob Stump.

DASNY/SAM Grants – Senator Walczyk's office continues to try to track down any leads they can regarding this rant money owed to us. Today I was told the Democratic Majority Leaders are holding this money up.

We recently submitted reimbursement vouchers to DEC for Hamlets Gateway Project - \$16,024 and Byron Park/Branding - \$39,075. Total reimbursement=\$55,099.

We are also in the process of requesting a modification for another old DASNY SAM Award which was to be used for Equestrian Trails. This project will not be realized so we are hoping the funds can be reallocated to the mountain bike trails. Grant amount is for \$50,000.

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
