Landfill Monitoring

Supervisor Wells stated that the company we currently used for our Landfill Monitoring now will only do 2 of the testings, they will do 3 however they will be charging us much more to do this. He stated there is a rush on this and we need to get this done. He also stated that in 2026 we will be in the 30 year mark. He stated that we will need to sign a contract, 2 with CPL and 1 with ALS Group, he stated the costs will be higher this year and wanted to give the Board a heads up.

Trash Day

Supervisor Wells reminded all that June 4th and 5th will be the annual trash days. He also stated that 640 pounds of garbage was collected on Community Pride Day. He thanked all the Departments and volunteers.

Supervisor Comments

Supervisor Wells reported to the Board that the AATV Membership meeting will be June 2nd and 3rd in Lake Placid if any Board Members would like to go.

Supervisor Wells stated he wrote a letter of support for the Roost CEO, he stated there will be a change in Roost. He explained to all they are Hamilton County's promotional tool and they do a lot of work for the 5 Towns as well as Indian Lake.

Supervisor Wells stated questions had been asked concerning the possibility of going to appointed TownClerk/Tax Collector and appointed Highway Superintendent. He stated to all this would have to have a public hearing and if the Board wants to move forward on this they will need to make a decision now, to get it to the Board of elections by August as this would be on the ballot to be voted on by the constituents.

Supervisor Wells reported to all that the Town Clerk will be retiring, June 19th. He told all that an AD had been placed and at this time one had been turned back in.

Supervisor Wells told all present that we have received the payment from our Bond Anticipation Note. He told all there will be a pay schedule concerning all payments.

Supervisor Wells reported to all that he had received a request from Juniper Farms to hold their produce in the Town's cooler at the Welcome Center. They requested space for their product from Thursday afternoon to Saturday morning. The Farmers market is held from July 6th – September 28th. Any surplus will go to Community Action. Letter attached herein. All were in favor of allowing this.

Supervisor Wells reported to all that Hamilton County is a member of Intercounty. He stated that each year one of the Town's hosts the annual meeting of Legislatures and Supervisors and this Year it is Hamilton County's turn to host. Supervisor Wells stated he would like to have this at the Theater as they would like to show an EMS film concerning the struggle EMS are having throughout all rural towns. He asked the Board if he could use one of the Towns six uses of the Theater to host this meeting., This will be held on July 25th. He also told all that Axes and Irons will be hosting the members as well in the afternoon. Councilman Rathbun made a motion to allow Supervisor Wells to use one of the Towns six uses for this meeting. Seconded by, Councilwoman Eldridge.

He told all that the cannons and rifles would be firing, but of course they will be blanks. He told all that Friday will be Student Day. He told all that there will be stations set up such as pilgrim's, Viking's, civil war, World War one, World War two, and the revolutionary war.

Buildings and maintenance report April 2024

April started off with the eclipse, over 5000 people showed up and Christine had a great game plan, we put up signs, banners, trashcans, raked the parking lot at the Little League field and prepped that for a food truck and ice cream vendor, we barricaded off the parking lot at the Town hall and created a space for a second food truck. after the event was over, we cleaned up everything we could that night and finished the following day.

We have been very busy cleaning up all the lawns on all town properties, raking the stones back into driveways and turning over sod.

We spread another dump truck load of number two stone on chain Lakes Road for the gazebo. We grabbed the loader from the transfer site to level off the pad and expect delivery in the next few weeks.

We began painting at Town hall, we are going through the entire building painting it white, while we are there, we have fixed some shelving, sheet rock, and a few other problems that we found.

Two of my guys helped the water and Sewer Dept install a new pump at the east plant, after that was done water and Sewer used our mini excavator to work in blue Mountain, one of their guys helped us at the Ski Hut ditching the driveway for us while everyone was in the field doing other projects.

Three new exterior doors have been ordered and installed for the highway department, replacing the three main entry points where the doors were getting very rusty and weak.


At the Cedar River cemetery we have found seven graves that need to have bases poured and a few graves we have to dig in the middle of May.

May 13, 2024, Town of Indian Lake Board Meeting Economic Development, Marketing & Events Report

Community/Economic Development

LCDC's SIB (Sabbal, Indian Lake, Blue Mountain Lake Re-Vibe) Committee – A subcommittee meeting is scheduled for May 16 at 3PM at the Indian Lake Restaurant to discuss placement of the white canoes and other related SIB business. Discussion is also pending re: purchase and placement of bike racks in town.

NPT (Northville-Placid Trail) turns 100 on June 1, 2024 –2024 marks the 100th anniversary of the Northville-Placid Trail. ROOST, the Adirondack Mountain Club, the Adirondack Experience (ADKX), the Indian Lake Theater, and towns and villages throughout the region are working together to commemorate this historic milestone.

During the week of July 7, ADKX and Indian Lake Theater are collaborating on special programs and events to celebrate Hamilton County's position along the trail. We invite your business to join us at the celebration! During the week, visitors to Long Lake, Indian Lake, and Blue Mountain Lake will be encouraged to complete a challenge—stopping at businesses and at our two organizations to collect stamps. Participating businesses can do as little as stamping a visitor's sheet. (Stamps will be provided at no cost.) For those interested in a greater level of participation, we encourage you to offer a discount, special menu item, or other incentive for your customers. Additionally, there will be a drawing for those visitors who complete the challenge. We would appreciate any prizes contributed by area businesses for the drawing.

Northville-Placid Trail 100 Anniversary Celebration is on August 24 from 1-5pm at the Inn on Piseco Lake.

Northville Kick off for NPT will happen May 3-June 2. A closing event will be held on September 14 in Lake Placid.

Partnerships with the Adirondack Foundation – I was invited to attend an Economic Development leadership Roundtable at their heaven Hill farm on July 18 but was unable to attend due to my knee surgery. Mary Alice O'Conner (Indian Lake Theater), Davanna Marks (Cabins at Chimney Mountain), and Lisa Karam (L&J catering & Moore) attended to represent Indian Lake and Hamilton County. Due to their participation the Town of Indian Lake was asked to host two upcoming events for the Foundation – The State of Social Society (6/8) and Community Voices (7/18). Both events will be held at the theater.

Inter-County Meeting – Is planned for July 25 at the Indian Lake Theater. More details to follow.

Events

Citizens Preparedness Event – was held on April 24 with 12 in attendance who all received a free emergency backpack filled with various supplies.

Community Pride Day – Cleanup day is May 1, 2024. We had the largest volunteer group in my time. 38 volunteers for Indian Lake and 16 in Blue Mountain Lake for a total of 54. We picked up close to 700 pounds of trash. Thanks to Bill's crew for circling back to pick up all the bags. We had bagged lunches courtesy of One Stop and cookie platters from L&J Catering and Moore. I do have additional T-shirts available if anyone would like one.

Solar Eclipse Debriefing – Was held on April 30 in person and via ZOOM with 12 in attendance. Many of the comments included how many visitors were thanking the volunteers for organizing the event, lack of trash left behind, popularity of the food trucks, and controlled traffic exodus. We estimated 5,000 attendees with visitors from 22 states and 22 countries. Many thanks again to ALL that helped!!!

Great Adirondack Yard Sale is May 24-25. Folks are in the process of registering online at [Great Adirondack Garage Sale | Great Adirondack Garage Sale](#). This is typically a chamber of commerce hosted activity in conjunction with ROOST. I have reached out to ROOST to learn how I can obtain access to the printed maps and listings for Indian and Blue Mountain Lake.

Memorial Day Parade on May 27 is in Inlet this year.

Citizen of the Year – Solicitations are out to the public now. Nominations forms were mailed to all community organizations this week. Final selection will be announced on June 10, 2024, at the Board Meeting. Application forms are available online at [www.indianlakeadk.com](#), at the Welcome Center and Town Hall.

Black Fly Challenge on Saturday, June 8 ends in Indian lake this year. The race is maxed out at 1,000 riders. There is a volunteer recruitment party scheduled for Thursday, May 9 from 6 to 7pm at the Indian Lake Restaurant. Free drinks and appetizers will be on Inlet Area Business Association which hosts the Black Fly race.

Monarch Fest is Saturday, June 15. Plans are currently underway. We will have entertainment (song, stories, and dance) by two native Americans, plain air painting demo by Sarah Yeoman, make your own wooden beaded butterfly bracelets and necklaces, make your own pollinator seed balls, decorate butterfly masks and wands (to be used in the grand finale dance). Currently working on getting educational representatives from other organizations to attend (HCSWD and ADK Action).

Independence Day Celebration – Will be held on Saturday, July 6. Planning for parade, music with Mitch Frasier, and fireworks is underway.

Marketing

Brochure Racks and Trifolds for 2024 Events – I purchased plastic rack card/brochure holders for area businesses to use to display our event brochure and maps in their businesses. We will check in periodically to keep them full and up to date.

DASNY/SAM Grants – No new updates.

DEC EV Charging Stations – I sent back the revised budget on May 3, which required adding in the amount of \$10,680 to cover a ten-year guarantee on the EV equipment. Hoping we'll see the final contract come through before the end of the month.

Voucher for Reimbursement/Hamlets Gateway Grant – Still waiting for the reimbursement from 1/21/2023. I will be submitting the final report and request for reimbursement before the end of may as required.

Adirondack Generous Act – We were awarded a \$7,500 grant from the Adirondack Foundation for a generator for the Welcome Center. **I will/should have bids for review at the board meeting to share with the board for approval.**

Adirondack Park Upper Hudson Rec Grant – I applied for \$15,000 to apply to a \$23,000 project for Wilderness Property Management to create the third bike trail at the Ski Hut. Grant awards should be announced soon. I sent an email inquiry about the status on 4/10/24.

Adirondack Community Recreation Alliance – I applied for \$3,000 for the bike trails and was awarded this amount. The award is pending approval from Upper Hudson and a remaining request for \$5K from the Black Fly Challenge group.

Re: Proposed use of the Indian Lake Welcome Center Cooler

This spring the Indian Lake Community Farmers Market learned that two of its long-time vendors, Hope Valley Farm and Blackberry Hill Farm would not be able to join us in 2024. While the owners of these farms always enjoyed our market and turned a profit, one owner is taking a year off to focus on overdue maintenance, while the other has secured a spot at the year-round Saturday market in Glens Falls, and neither have the staff to do these things as well as come to Indian Lake.

Residents and visitors alike have come to depend on the market, and it has become a hub for the community each Saturday from July through September. It has always been the availability of fresh food that draws people in initially, and they go on to explore the variety of crafts we have available. As a result, the LLCFM board has been brainstorming how to continue the market without the participation of a farmer.

Fortunately, a solution has emerged, but we need the Town of Indian Lake's support to make it happen. We propose to buy produce wholesale from Juniper Hill Farm in Westport, and take delivery of it on Thursdays prior to the market. However, we need a cool, secure place to store the produce until we pick it up Saturday mornings for sale that day. **Christine Pouch and I spoke on April 29 about the possibility of our Thursday afternoon to Saturday morning purchase in the Welcome Center's cooler each Thursday afternoon to Saturday morning during July, August and September.** I understand these rooms stay acceptably cool without turning on the refrigeration on most days.

I would like to note some other changes that we plan to make at the market this summer. LLCFM has participated in the Blue Mountain Center's Hamilton County Healthy Food Connections program, which distributes booklets of \$2 coupons to those in need which they can spend at area farmers markets. This year BMC and LLCFM will be partnering to facilitate acceptance of SNAP benefits, ADK Action's Fair Food cards, and credit/debit cards. All of this will encourage greater use of the LLCFM by area residents, and further promote Indian Lake and its farmers market to the public.

I look forward to meeting with the Board on May 13, and hope that we will be able to count on your support to help our small but vibrant volunteer-run market be a continued success.

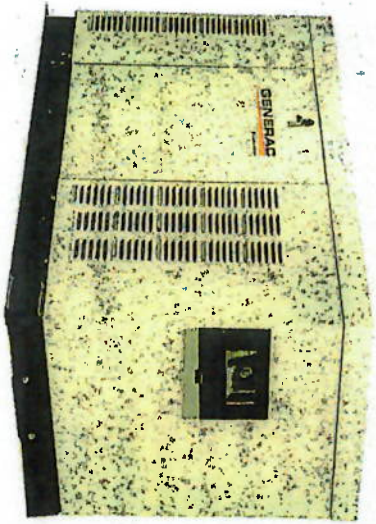


Supervisor Wells made a motion to exit Executive Session at 8:03 p.m. Seconded by, Councilman Rathbun. All in favor. Motion carried.
