

**A TOWN BOARD MEETING** was held on July 08, 2024 at 7:00 p.m. The location was the Town Hall, Pelon Road, Town of Indian Lake, County of Hamilton, State of New York.

Supervisor Wells brought the meeting to order. All said the Pledge of Allegiance. Supervisor Wells called for the Roll with the following Board Members answering:

Councilwoman Eldridge made a motion to approve the Minutes of 6/10/2024 as presented. Seconded by, Councilman Mahoney.

**Citizen of the Year Award:**

Supervisor Wells started a speech to present our Citizen of the Year, Ken Cannan, his award. It was presented to him by his family followed by some pictures. After following, the Legion, specifically Brian Hutchins went on to present Ken with yet another award. Ken stated he is stepping down as commander and it is now Brian Hutchins' responsibility and Brian went on to present the Commander Award to Ken. That was also followed by pictures.

**Department Head Reports/Additions:**

Councilman Rathbun wanted to give all the departments a pat on the back and thanked everyone for their work. Department Head Bill Laprairie was asked by Supervisor Wells to confirm a meeting with Bill Laprairie at the transfer station Thursday, July 11<sup>th</sup>.

Supervisor Wells turned over to Highway Superintendent Tom Atwell to discuss problems with the 2007 loader vehicle, talks about a replacement. Supervisor Wells stated they received an OK from CHIPS funding towards the purchase of a new one. Steve Cannan expressed many things wrong with the loader such as center pins, injector lines, etc. Council Rathbun expressed that if there's equipment that is unsafe for the employees, and receiving a good deal from the dealer, he would agree to the purchase. Councilman Rathbun created a motion to move ahead on the deal with United on the purchase of a loader for the Highway Department using the CHIPS money and the budget. Seconded by Councilman Mahoney. Councilwoman Howard expressed she can't decide on it at the meeting in that moment and would like to do more research just to be certain, it wasn't a yes nor a no more so thinking out loud. Also stated, Atwell was appointed as Highway Superintendent to make these decisions so she will honor that. Supervisor Wells asked for any further discussion which no one replied. All in favor.

Head of Events, Christine Pouch shared they'll be using picnic tables for the Family event at Axes and Irons, July 13<sup>th</sup>. Christine expressed that the set up for the July 4<sup>th</sup> celebration on Saturday the

6<sup>th</sup> by Parks and Rec was much appreciated between the tent and the stage for the music. Councilwoman Howard had a suggestion from someone in attendance about maybe a mobile light. It was suggested by a few to talk to DOT about a mobile light that would plug into a generator. Next was the Blackfly Challenge, the group is presenting us with a check for \$5,300 that'll go to the final piece of funding to complete the third multi-use trail at the Ski Hut. Wilderness Property Management has a quote for \$23,300, the town was granted \$15k from The Nature Conservancy and Upper Hudson Rec. Also obtained a grant for \$3k from ARCA, Adirondack Community Recreation Alliance connected to Northern Forrest. Supervisor Wells reminded that this is a 5-year plan that might've had to skip a year but between Christines work and with grants, we're on schedule with that.

### **Public Comments and Concerns:**

Samantha Branch was the first to speak regarding a concern about a man-made dam on Cedar River Road. Waiting to hear back from DEC, they explained to her that the owner of the dam, which is a nearby property owner, could make the decision to breach it. Her question ultimately is if the town knows about the dam and if there is an accidental breach of the dam, who would we advise of that being the owners live out of state. Supervisor Wells answered by stating the owners are supposed to have an Emergency Action Plan on file. Samantha is also curious to find out who to contact if it was breached, what would happen to the fisheries nearby. She stated that it isn't recorded as high risk, due to no loss of life threat but still a severe property damage risk. Supervisor Wells informed us it's called the Indian Lake Power and Light Company Dam, the condition rating that was recorded in '23 is unsound, and the hazard description is intermediate hazard. Mentions about grants through the DEC website to help fix dams in these circumstances. Supervisor Wells stated he's waiting to hear back from a few sources.

Next, John Voorhees was concerned about the new legislation awaiting approval from Governor Hochul. The bill includes revenue and would place a sales tax on short-term rentals, which would fall on consumers looking to book a stay. John thought of a possible plan to put something in place already to maybe opt out of it, thinking it may be detrimental to our town. Supervisor Wells didn't necessarily think that was an option after reading the bill because to his knowledge you would have to have something already in effect before the bill is signed. Councilman Mahoney spoke on the topic mentioning he read the bill as well that if there's something within 90-120 days of the bill signing there is an opportunity to put something in place. Supervisor Wells said he'll go back to his notes on the topic and look back into it.

John Sleckman spoke representing the Chamber of Commerce. From May the welcome center is open on Saturday, 10-2 and since being open on Saturdays they've seemed to have a lot of walk-in's and phone calls answered. He mentioned there's a hotline number on the Facebook Page, which you can call at any time of the day and someone will get back very shortly. For events they had a float in the parade, they're sponsoring the Poker Paddle, Saturday July 13<sup>th</sup>, working on the Moose Festival coming in September, and talks about putting together a Fall Mixer. Councilwoman Howard asked if there were plans to hire someone full time or is the chamber planning with volunteers. Talks about the budget and how much it would take salary-wise for the Chamber to be up and running like it has been in years past. Councilman Mahoney stated he knows he previously mentioned he'd be open Saturdays but is there any other days we'll know he's there, John replied with he's been there the past couple Fridays and plans to be there this Friday. John stated there's only so much time he can give being a volunteer and it can be quite difficult finding more volunteers but he's hopeful that'll change soon with plans to extend hours.

Connie Sahler was next to speak regarding the Peak to Brew on August 9<sup>th</sup>, a relay race that starts in North Creek this year and ends in Utica and possible stops through Indian Lake that day for runners. Supervisor Wells explained since it is a state event, the state DOT will reach out to our team and ask if there's any objection to that. Connie mentioned that people in connection with the race were waiting to hear from the Supervisor and he stated he'll go back through and check.

Andy Coney was next to speak and with him he brought a printed list of regulations in place for the town made a few years back. The regulations state along the lines that items such as pinwheels,

ribbons, banners etc. are not to be used on or as signs for businesses. Supervisor Wells stated he'd have to file a violation complaint through Tyler our Building Code Enforcement officer, which Councilwoman suggested being Andy brought it to the board maybe a board member could bring it to Tyler. Supervisor Wells agreed to make a note to talk to Tyler next. Councilwoman Howard next asked Andy what 'BluMouLA BuFuRa' is, happening in Blue Mountain. 'BluMouLA BuFuRa' is a race on July 21<sup>st</sup> at 10:30 am, takes paddlers and rowers on Blue Mountain, Eagle and Utowawa Lakes, benefits go to the Blue Mtn Lake Association.

#### **Sugar Bush Bids:**

Next covered was Sugar Bush Bid applications. There was one application received from William and Kathleen Herrick at \$1 a tap, for a year 5 agreement September 2024 to August 2029. Supervisor Wells made a motion to accept the bid. Seconded by Councilman Rathbun. Further discussion, Supervisor Wells thinks it's great Bill carries a tradition with the kids down through the field and to the sugar house to watch the process and learn a lot from it.

#### **Supervisor Comments:**

There was a site visit regarding work on the dam with the engineers on Tuesday July 9<sup>th</sup> but it was rescheduled to July 23<sup>rd</sup>, Supervisor Wells will be requesting one of our Department Heads to step in at the meeting. As mentioned last month, on July 25<sup>th</sup> we'll be showcasing the theater, a few businesses, and the town in general. The Indian Lake Museum is closed until further notice, it is unsafe to allow anyone in the building currently due to structural damage over winter. Still waiting for the FEMA meeting, received a letter about losing funding and Supervisor Wells contacted them to remind them we're waiting on them to schedule a meeting to go over the funding. Next was a complaint about the Blue Mountain tennis courts, Supervisor Wells stated Bill was going to go there the next day to take pictures to assess the issue. Supervisor Wells mentions the battery storage laws and how a plan needs to be revised. DEC is proposing transitions to paper licensing and has already started being put into effect.

#### **Other Town Business:**

Supervisor Wells had talks about the Water/Sewer job opening, with an off date picking July 15<sup>th</sup> to close applications when it's been previously done before board meetings, this way it can be decided by the board as well. At this time, one application has been received. Department Head Pat Mahoney was asked to set up an interview including Councilmen Rathbun and Mahoney. Mentions of our Monarch Butterfly tent set up here in the Town Hall that will be spread all throughout town such as the school, library, etc. Supervisor Wells had a meeting with the CDC regarding banners adding more poles and possibly developing a policy that will be a budget item. Talks about obtaining a bucket truck, using the loader for this task seems to be too much for that piece of equipment. Pat Mahoney explained another use for a bucket truck that could help with pulling a well or along the lines, so the bucket truck would have multiple uses. Councilman Rathbun is doing a boating license course on August 3<sup>rd</sup> and asked if it's possible to use the Ski Hut for that day. Reminding everyone whoever runs a motorboat needs to have a certification.

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## Monthly report Building Maintenance and Operations June 2024

The first week in June had us start off with trash cleanup days, all the departments work together on the fourth and the fifth cleaning up all the trash and debris that everyone managed to bring out to the roadside. 22,300 pounds of metal and 16,460 pounds of C&D were picked up over the two days.

The Black fly challenge ended in Indian Lake this year, the three-day set up at the school had us putting up barricades, tents, fencing, garbage cans, 16 picnic tables, running power, putting up signs, putting cones out on the road and building a last-minute stage with a tent set up. After the event everything was taken down and cleaned up.

Met with DOT engineers about the Blue Mountain Lake speed limit signs, locations were agreed-upon, and the signs were installed, one sign is by the Durant Road intersection the other one is next to Blue Mountain store.

Town properties have been mowed twice this month, including the Cedar River cemetery, Catholic cemetery and Blue Mountain cemetery.

Both the Blue Mountain and the Chain Lakes Beach were put in, all new ropes at Chain Lakes and a new kitty pool line for Blue Mountain. Buildings and bathrooms were cleaned the lifeguards will be responsible when they take over. Garbage runs are done on Tuesdays and Fridays for beaches, Parks, and shop.

The gateway grant is officially completed, the gazebo arrived and put the finishing touches on the little park at the end of Chain Lakes Road, we plan on putting in Adirondack chairs and a small bench area where you can sit enjoy the view and go through brochures.

We helped the highway cut trees, move equipment and helped with some ditching on a few roads. Jeremiah has been running excavator, Steven and Alan 1 ton dump truck and trailer when needed.

Seven bases have been poured for stones in the Cedar River cemetery and one in the Benton cemetery.

**June 24, 2024, Phone Conversation with Margaret Ambrose, DASNY SAM Grants**

Project ID# 6505 – Construction of an Equestrian Facility

We rec'd documentation to pursue this funding FOR \$50,000 on April 12, 2023. On July 6, 2023, I submitted the information required as a REQUEST FOR PROJECT CHANGE to MULTIUSE RECREATIONAL TRAILS.

Margaret reported on July 13, 2023, the request was entered into the DASNY SAM system, and its status is currently "waiting for change of approval."

Project ID#6948 – Acquisition and Demolition of a Building and Infrastructure

This \$300,000 award dates to September 17, 2015, for The Townsend Project. As of March 5, 2021, the system indicates the status is "up for final approval."

I specifically asked her if we decided to sell this property, would we still be eligible to receive the money once it did become available. Her answer was NO, and it would not be eligible for a change of project as project #6505 is.

She further stated that we should not be expending any dollars (incurring any costs) to a project until we have the final DASNY SAM contract in hand.

Project ID#7914 – Adirondack Dam Repair

This \$2.5M project dates to July 29, 2016. The status in their system is "up for final approval as of January 4, 2019.

Other notes: She stated her director Karen Hunter has made it her mission to inquire about all these DASNY projects which have yet to be funded weekly. She reiterated we are doing what we should, by contacting the senate sponsor regularly. Our sponsor was Hugh Farley at the time but now its Senator Walczyk.

### Community/Economic Development

ILCDC's SIB (Sabael, Indian Lake, Blue Mountain Lake Re-Vibe) Committee – No updates to report.

Northville-Placid Trail 100 Anniversary Celebration is on August 24 from 1-5pm at the Inn on Piseco Lake. A closing event will be held on September 14 in Lake Placid.

The Town will be supporting Family Fun Day on July 13 by lending this committee some of our picnic tables.

Partnerships with the Adirondack Foundation – On July 18, the Town of Indian lake will again host an event for the Adirondack Foundation at the Indian Lake Theater. This event, Community Voices, brings together donors to the foundation with grant award recipients. The event is from 2 to 4PM and will include a walking tour to visit the various award recipient locations which include The Free Little Clothing Shop and the Town's Welcome Center along with the Indian Lake Theater.

Inter-County Meeting – Is planned for July 25 at the Indian Lake Theater. More details to follow.

### Events

**Citizen of the Year** –Ken Cannan was chosen as the 2024 Citizen of the Year and he will be recognized officially at the July 8 Board meeting. All are welcome to come.

**Black Fly Challenge** is over. Another successful year with a small number of minor injuries. This group will be presenting the Town of Indian Lake with a check for \$5,300 which will be directed to the multiuse recreational trails at the Ski Hut. Next year the race begins in Indian Lake. Without the assistance of Bill's team, setup for this event would have been impossible. The event is also highly dependent on the support from ILVAC, ILVFD and the school.

**Monarch Fest** was a success with approximately 100 visitors in attendance. The interactive native American music was a huge hit as well as the face painting and butterfly stilt walker. The weather was very windy and made it a challenge for our stilt walker and keeping the numerous activity stations from blowing away. The stage set up and picnic tables provided by Bill's team were very much appreciated.

**Independence Day Celebration** – The plan for Saturday, July 6 includes a parade route from Bennett Road to Town Hall. The music will be on the Townsend Property with a stage and large tent with picnic tables. The maple Wagon will be onsite serving ice cream. Fireworks will be launched from Byron Park back parking area with the hopes they can also be viewed from the main stage area.

**Lake Adirondack Dam Repair  
2024 WQIP AUTHORIZING RESOLUTION**

**WHEREAS**, the Department of Environmental Conservation has made funds available for dam repair and rehabilitation through the Water Quality Improvement Program (WQIP) through the 2024 Consolidated Funding Application, and

**WHEREAS**, the Lake Adirondack Dam is a Class C high hazard dam with several urgent and persistent issues that have been cited by DEC and noted by the Town, and

**WHEREAS**, the Town has made significant investments in the study and design of dam repairs that will address the Lake Adirondack Dam issues, resulting in certified and stamped Engineering Report and Plans and a work permit to perform upgrades to the specification of the Plans that is valid through 2025, and

**WHEREAS**, the costs associated with making the dam improvements to the specifications of the Plans and providing for the long-term stability and soundness of the dam are a financial commitment that would unreasonably burden the Town and its residents without additional funding sources to offset the project costs, and

**WHEREAS**, the Town of Indian Lake is seeking funding through the 2024 WQIP application as an additional source of funding to complement the \$2.5 million funding committed to the Town through the DASNY SAM program,

**NOW THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED**, that Town of Indian Lake authorizes and empowers the Town Supervisor, to sign and submit a grant application to the Department of Environmental Conservation and any associated documents; and it is


**FURTHER RESOLVED**, that this Resolution shall take effect immediately.
