Heaters have been installed in the shop and are running with no problems so far.

This month I hired 3 new employees for the highway department: Marty Ford as the office assistant, and Marty Hutchins and Jonathan Stanton for the highway crew. I had to let Stephen Gadway go for personal reasons.

We are getting close to purchasing a new Grader. The lawyer has given the paperwork to the Supervisor to be discussed at this month's meeting.

All plows have been removed and we are servicing the trucks. We have started hauling our sand for next winter and will start working on roads this month to get them ready for paving.

March 2025 building maintenance and operations report

Started off March with a full day of Friday recycling and Monday everything was done again for the second half of town. Garbage runs have been made from Blue Mountain and Indian Lake, and restrooms were cleaned and restocked at the same time.

On town buildings we removed 4 feet of ice and snow from the edges to allow for drainage and stop water from backing up into some of the buildings. All walks and buildings have been shoveled, sanded and salted as needed. Some grounds work was started at the health center and at the town hall fixing sod that has been rolled up by plowing, cutting branches, and pruning trees on some lawns.

Work at the welcome center continues, the walls have been spackled, sanded and painted. Conduit lines have been installed in the trusses for entry into the new DANC facility. Waiting on 400 amp service install from National Grid.

Grooming equipment has all been brought back to the shop with the exception of the big blue New Holland up in headquarters, that machine will be moved back to town after the roads are open. Two machines have been serviced and put away until next years snowmobile season. Snowmobiles have been serviced and put away for the season as well and minor repairs were made.

Lawn mowers, rakes and tractors have been brought back to the shop for service, the 1025 John Deere had the snowblower taken off and mower deck and rake installed.


Servicing town trucks and other vehicles has been done, trailer light plug has been replaced on 17 Chevy.

BTI has started, checking streams and gathering information, first treatment should start in the month of April.

Generator install has been completed at the Library and the Townhall, we wait now on J&R Eldredge to do the fuel line hook ups and Brian from Adirondack generators to come back program the generators and bring them online. Dirt work has been completed, cleanup will be coming in the month of April.

End of year trail work has began checking bridges and culverts.

Town of Indian Lake water and wastewater report for March 2025

The plants were tested daily.

DOH and DEC samples were submitted to the lab.

Nate completed his 2A and Basic water operation classes.

The sewer lateral for the library had to be dug up and have a clean-out installed so we could jett out a blockage.

We repaired a large water main break in Blue Mt. A boil water order had to be issued by DOH. It was lifted within a couple days.

The sewer pump at the town's bus garage burned up and the sewer line froze up. We fixed both issues.

We had to repair a main break in front of the water plant on Chain Lakes Rd.

The sewer line for Hamilton Ct. Probation had to be jetted out.

P&T Supply came and replaced the well pumps on #2 and #4 wells. They also cleaned both well casings and screens on those wells. It was recommended to have a chemical cleaning on well #2. #4 well went from 25 GPM to 90 GPM with the new pump and cleaning. #2 well went from 25 GPM to 42 GPM.

Mechanics Report – March 2025

- 192- Brought into the shop and check all fluids and inspect machine from winter use.
- 3320- Replace driver side door glass.
- 182- Charge batteries and get started from wintertime storage. Brought into shop and checked over and replaced leaking air tank drain. Topped off all fluids.
- 185- Find air leaks on firewall and replace fittings.
- 186 Sander- Inspect chain and bearing condition before removal from truck for summer months. Drag links will need to be removed before reinstalling next winter.
- Check in of new Western Star Tandem.
- 182- Road tested and diagnosed faulty rear cab mounts. Tracey Road Equipment wanted 700 dollars per side. We found an aftermarket company out of Texas that offered a cab mount kit for 200.
- Cleaned Shop and took inventory of supplies.
- 194- Removed plow and welded center pin retainer. Replaced main frame bolts with new grade 8 hardware.
- 186 Sander- Removed from truck and stored onto our sawhorses. This way I can rebuild the sander during warmer months. Installed Tailgate back onto truck.
- Sewer And Water Departments 3500 HD- Diagnosed intermittent issue with the box either not raising or lowering. I found faulty solenoid and Controller. Replaced solenoid with a heavier duty solenoid and power cables. Replaced Controller with new from Dejana.
- Toolcat- Remove snow blower and install broom.
- Take broom core inventory for toolcat and john deere 3320.
- We went to Saratoga to Demo and checked out a Caterpillar grader.
- Sewer and Water Departments 2500 HD- Brought into shop to diagnose steering and brake issue. Found faulty power steering pump. Replaced power steering pump flushed lines and filled system and bleed air from lines. Road tested afterwards.
- 185- Remove head plow, wing, and Sander Grates.
- 186- Brought into the shop to find air leak. Found primary air pressure tank corroded and leaking where the tank straps mount. Replaced the air tank and fixed air leak at inlet for air dryer.
- 182- Replaced wet line pressure fittings on both truck and trailer.
- TC45D- Wash and diagnose hydraulic oil leak on engine.
- Set up hydraulic room with Gates Rep.

- 3320- Remove broom subframe and weld.
- 182- Jacked up cab and replaced both rear cab mounts. Fixed coolant leak at top of radiator.
- 192- Go to chain lakes road and fixed A.C pump mounting bracket. I was able to get enough bolts back into the bracket so we could drive back to the shop and have the machine fixed under warranty from John Deere.
- 3320- Made new hydraulic hoses for broom attachment.
- 186- Diagnose crank but no start condition in the back yard. Filled air tanks and towed into shop to continue working on it. Load tested batteries and found two of the three batteries were no good. Replaced all three batteries with new ones. While I had batteries out, I cleaned up all the connections. Truck still wouldn't start. I did further research on 60 series Detroit's and found 2 sensors located on front of engine housing referred to as the SRS and TRS sensors. One sensor prevents the truck from starting and the other sensor prevents the truck from continuing to run. I called Tracey Road Equipment and ordered both sensors. Replaced sensors and Truck now runs as it should. I Test drove vehicle to verify fix.
- 185- Freed up brake slack adjuster pins and measured slack adjuster throws. All were within spec. I replaced the leaking air solenoid for the tailgate lock dogs.
- I replaced the recoil rope on the Water Departments Honda Trash pump.
- 195- I brought the truck into the shop because the wing and head plow wouldn't function. I called T and T body king where the truck was built and had them E mail a wiring diagram for hydraulics system on truck. While the truck was in the shop, we noticed that the passenger side rear spring pack was broken and starting to separate. They then stripped the truck of the head plow, wing, and sander so that the suspension could be repaired. I called three different spring shops and Whitesboro Spring out of Utica New York had the quickest turn around and was the most knowledgeable of ways to improve truck so it wouldn't be a further issue next plowing season.
- 180- I brought the truck into the shop to diagnose engine exhaust leak. I found broken exhaust manifold bolts on both sides also cracked exhaust manifolds. Removed exhaust manifolds and drilled out broken bolts and replaced them with new manifolds and hardware. While I had the truck apart, I replaced the spark plugs and wires.

Community/Economic Development

Adirondack Summer Sports Expo in Saratoga was held Saturday-Sunday, March 22-23. The Chamber paid for the booth, and Kylie helped man the booth along with the Davanna and Mary from the Chamber. Kylie alone spoke to approximately 600 people who stopped by the booth to share upcoming events and details about Indian Lake. This event is an excellent opportunity to showcase our community.

NYSDEC Eastern Black Bear Workshops are being held April 7-11. On April 9, they invited communities to the event to engage in important discussions to decrease the negative interactions with bears and to promote strategies and solutions re: implementing their NYSDEC Bearwise educational program. Christine will be attending this special one day event.

2025 ANCA Clean Energy + Small Communities, Big Opportunities Conference is being held April 30-May 2. This unique three-day gathering convenes small business and clean energy stakeholders and community leaders who are invested in strengthening North Country businesses and communities through collaborative, action-oriented initiatives. Through a variety of networking and learning opportunities, conference participants will explore ways we can work together to foster strong, resilient and inclusive North Country communities. Christine will be attending this conference again this year.

Lifeguards & Beaches Christine submitted updated bathing beach safety plans in March, and we have received our approved NYSDOH Beach Permits. Kylie has updated the 2025 Beach Binders. We are recruiting lifeguards and are pleased to report that Andrea Puterko will be returning as a senior guard this year. We'll be welcoming two new guards (1) Hannah Henry who has been a certified guard and swim instructor for the last three years at a YMCA Camp. She'll be spending the summer with Garrett Hutchins' family; and (2) Also joining us will be ILCS student Morgan Scofield as a first-time guard. We are hoping for one more guard which will allow us an opportunity to possibly keep both beaches open with consistent schedules. Training and certifications for the guards are available in May and June by an American Red Cross instructor from Minerva. Town training will commence in June with assistance from Bill LaPrairie, Kimberley Crandall, as well as Christine and Kylie

2025 Town of Indian Lake Job Fair was held on Saturday, April 5. We had 15 businesses participate including: Minnowbrook Conference Center, Community Bank, Stewart's Shops, NYSDOT, Schoolhouse Grounds Coffee Shop, Indian Lake Theater, Timberlock, Cabins at Chimney Mountain, NYSDEC, Twin Coves, PITS Tax Service, Sunmount, Blue Mountain Lake Corner Store, Blue Mountain Rest, and 4 Rivers Alliance. The Town provided free setup with tables and chairs. While we only had 10 prospective job seekers, all felt the event was worthwhile and had a few leads. NYSDEC also held a job fair at their location on the same day and had 8 prospective job seekers. We will be compiling a list of job opportunities for those in attendance and creating a "virtual" job fair in the next few weeks. Individually packaged snacks will also be provided by the Town. The library will offer hands-on activities for the kids. Both Christine and Kylie will assist.

Community Pride Day will be held on Wednesday, May 7. We have 39 volunteers who signed up. L&J Catering and Moore will be providing free lunches for the volunteers. We will meet at 10am at the Welcome Center and divide and conquer our streets/roadways. Lunch will be served at the Ski Hut at Noon. The shirt design winner this year was ILCS student Nala Preston.



John Rathbun's group will be hosting its **2nd Annual Indian Lake Living History Timeline** on May 15 to 18. There will be displays and demonstrations throughout the day. For more information, contact John Rathbun, 518-648-5306 Leave a message.

The **Great Adirondack Yard Sale** organized by ROOST will be implemented by Indian Lake Chamber of Commerce May 23-25. You can sign up to be on the yard sale map by going to [Great Adirondack Garage Sale | Great Adirondack Garage Sale](#).

Hamilton County Memorial Day Parade will be hosted by the Town of Indian Lake this year. The parade will start at 1PM at Bennet Road and travel to Town Hall. Parade entry forms are available online, at Town Hall and the Welcome Center. This year's theme is American Pride. Invitations to participate were sent to all Hamilton County Supervisors on March 4 and April 7.

Black Fly Challenge starts in Indian Lake this year and will be held on June 14. The NYSDOT permit has been sent in. Registration at Town Hall will begin at 7am. The race starts at 10am. Registration sold out with 1,000 riders expected. Next up, we will be hosting a Volunteer Recruitment event at a local restaurant (paid for by BFC) in mid-May. More details to follow.

Independence Day will be celebrated on Saturday, July 6. The Washington County Line Bluegrass Band will be the featured music, with parade at 7PM and fireworks at dusk. The cost of the fireworks display came in at \$7,500 instead of \$9,000. We raised \$1,450 to date in sponsorships to help offset the cost budgeted vs. actual projected cost. \$600 will be applied to fireworks in 2025, and we'll continue to raise money to help with fireworks in 2026. Parade entry forms are currently available online.

Antiques and Rustic Shows will be getting new marketing materials based on the feedback we received last year from both vendors and visitors, as well as online feedback via social media recently. The two event campaigns will be marketed separately with unique branding for each. The list of property owners interested in renting out their yards has been updated and will be distributed as needed and online within the next few weeks.

Marketing

All calendars of events continue to be updated on a regular basis as needed. We are a member of the IABA in Inlet, so they also post and share our events. In 2025, we are adding our event listings to The Chronicle (still pending) and Adirondack.net. We have been posting, and will continue, on NCPR and Experience Our Adirondacks (Hamilton County Tourism Calendar).

Flyers, maps, and town event rack cards are continually refilled throughout the community on a weekly basis and as needed.

Grants

NEW: T-Mobile Hometown Grant was submitted for \$26,340 on March 31 for the final Multiuse Trail at the Ski Hut. Safety signage and trail markers will be mounted very soon – weather permitting. A trail map has been designed for users. A ribbon cutting is in the planning process to unveil the three completed trails.

A **Stewarts Holiday Match** grant application was submitted by Kimberley for youth sports programs and we received \$1,400.

NYS SWIMS application was submitted on 11/8/2024 with a request for \$9,950. Update: Award announcements are expected very soon, and we have been notified we will receive the full award via email. Advertisements for lifeguards are now being circulated. Our goal is to hire at least three lifeguards. The grant provides funding for the third lifeguards salary as well as sign-on and retention bonuses for all three.

Northern Forest Adirondack Housing Pre-Development Assistance Program RFP was approved. This RFP was seeking proposals from ADK municipalities wishing to receive pre-development technical support for potential housing projects. Support would include pre-development activities and preparing potential information packets for potential developers. The Town of Indian Lake was one of the eight projects chosen to receive desktop due diligence and feasibility assessments such as zoning review, review of easements, potential grant and tax credit funding, etc. Of the eight, five will be selected as the most suitable for development and will advance to a deeper pre-development phase. The Commons Project was approved. Update: This project continues to move forward.

DASNY/SAM Grants – We received a call from Senator Walczyk on 11/1/24 saying they are working on getting \$50,000 of the \$300,000 released early in 2025. We should be receiving paperwork to process after the new year. Still pending.

DEC EV Charging Stations This project is underway. Site plan has been approved. The contractor is working with National Grid to determine our rebate.

DEC Byron Park extension has been approved through July 2026. Waiting for the final contract to come back through the Statewide Financial System.

DEC EV Car Rebate's Letter of Agreement should be issued in the next two months.

AND TREATMENT IMPROVEMENT PROJECT**

WHEREAS, the Town wishes to consider undertaking a Water Supply and Treatment Project involving abandonment of certain test wells previously drilled by the Town, demolition of the existing surface water treatment plant, construction of a new surface water treatment plant and associated infrastructure and installation of water main and appurtenant facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Town previously declared its intension to serve as Lead Agency for purposes of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) and circulated notice of such intention to all known Involved Agencies; and

WHEREAS, more than 30 days has since elapsed and no Involved Agency has objected to the Town Board serving as Lead Agency.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Indian Lake Town Board as SEQRA Lead Agency, based on its review of EAF Part 1 and the answers it has provided to EAF Part 2 and having considered all relevant areas of environmental concern and taken the requisite "hard look", hereby finds and determines that no significant adverse environmental impacts will result from the Action, and hereby adopts a Negative Declaration; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Town Supervisor, Town Clerk, Town Engineering Consultants and Town Legal Counsel are hereby authorized to undertake all actions necessary to effectuate the terms of this Resolution including causing Notice of this Negative Declaration to be executed, distributed, filed and published in accordance with all lawful procedures, including, but not limited to, publication in the Environmental Notice Bulletin.

Be it enacted by the Town Board of the Town of Indian Lake as follows:

Section 1. The purpose of this local law is to grant a partial exemption from real property taxation to real property owned by one or more persons, each of whom are sixty-five years or age, or over, or real property owned by husband and wife, or by siblings, one of whom is sixty-five years of age, or over, and who maintain the property as their legal residence.

Section 2. No exemption shall be granted pursuant to the local law to any individual, or to any real property, unless all ownership, use and application provisions of Section 467 of Real Property Tax law have been met. Owner income, for purposes of this local law, shall be income as identified by Section 467.3 (a) of Real Property Tax Law, and shall be the total income of the owner, or the combined income of all owners, for the income tax year, or, if no income tax return has been filed, the calendar year, immediately preceding the date of making application.

Section 3. A partial exemption to real property taxes shall be granted to the owner(s) of the real property who qualifies according to their owner(s) income, as identified above, in accordance with the following schedule.

Dear Community Partner,

We continue our process of replacing 1.6 million electric meters and 600,000 gas modules with smart meters across upstate New York and want to provide you with an update and timing for your municipality.

As we previously communicated, smart meters will improve service and reliability, enable customers to control energy usage and allow us to provide faster outage response. Smart meters are a part of our ongoing commitment to build a more reliable, robust and sustainable energy grid.

The New York Public Service Commission approved the plan in 2021.

In preparation for smart meter deployment, we have installed field area network (FAN) devices on our poles to collect and transfer the smart meter data back to our data system. You may notice an increased National Grid presence while we complete this part of the project.

What to expect for your community.

The FAN installation work is largely complete in central and eastern New York, and we have started FAN deployment in western New York with expected completion later this year. Efforts to strengthen the network will continue as we deploy more meters.

- Since 2023 we have installed over 725,000 electric smart meters in central and eastern New York.
- Gas module installation has begun and will ramp up in 2025.
- Approximately 6,000 electric smart meters are being installed in western New York and bulk deployment is expected to ramp up in late summer, beginning with the Genesee region which includes Genesee, Livingston, Monroe, Ontario, Orleans and Wyoming counties.
- We expect all electric meters and gas modules to be installed by 2027.

To help customers and communities learn more about their installation and the benefits of smart meters, we have developed a comprehensive customer outreach plan including ways for customers to opt-out if they do not want a smart meter installed at their home or business. We invite you to learn more at ngrid.com/smartmeter. Customers with smart meters will be able to see their energy usage in their online profile in MyAccount. We will also be launching an app later this year which will disaggregate customer energy by end-use.
